- ingredients for fruit salad (variety of fruits, such as apples, bananas, kiwis, raisins, melon, berries)
- ingredients for veggie mash-up (e.g., carrots, squash, peas, yams, pumpkin; water for steaming)
- ingredients for roll-ups (1 package tortillas; cream cheese; mayonnaise or ranch dressing; vegetables such as cucumbers, carrots, lettuce, peppers, celery; lunch meat; shredded cheese; mild salsa)
- ingredients for applesauce (12 apples, cinnamon to taste, ½ c. brown sugar, 1 c. water)
- ingredients for pancakes (2 c. flour, 3 t. baking powder, ½ t. cinnamon, 2 eggs beaten, 2 c. milk or buttermilk, 2 t. melted butter or oil, butter or nonstick spray for skillet, fresh fruit or maple syrup)
- ingredients for fruit smoothies (milk formula or breast milk for infants, yogurt—optional, variety of fresh or frozen fruit)

#### Physical

- · crayons or markers

- collection of natural items (e.g., leaves, sticks, pinecones, pieces of bark)

- water hose and stationary plastic sprinkler (or, for infants, a soaker hose)

- plush or lightweight balls that are easy for children to grasp

- for nonmobile and mobile infants, soft surfaces to cushion the floor (e.g., blankets, mats, carpets, rugs)
- interesting objects for children to move into, reach for, grasp, and explore

- foam roller, rocking horse, or child-size rocking chair
- · toy doll or stuffed animal

- · cups of various widths
- · wands with handles of various widths
- household items (e.g., pipe-cleaner shapes, slotted spoons, plastic cookie cutters)
- ingredients for making bubbles (²/3 c. liquid dish soap, 1 qt. water, ¹/3 c. glycerin)
- large area with a flat surface on which to roll balls

- containers of various sizes and shapes in which to make ice (e.g., small milk cartons, muffin pans, small tin cans)

- familiar toys (e.g., rattle, stuffed animal, or ball)
- orange cones or other obstacles for older children
- ropes, cords, and ribbons (less than 8 inches in length)
- variety of dress-up clothes (e.g., buttondown shirts, shoes that close with hook-and-loop fasteners, belts, ties, loose dresses and skirts, suspenders, gloves)
- pieces of fabric that have different textures
- variety of sponges
- tambourines
- · plush or air-filled balls
- · variety of beach balls
- string
- blankets
- · small and large pillows
- small cloths
- large beads
- pipe cleaners or straws
- abacus stacker with large beads or wire-and-bead toy
- golf tees
- · wooden mallets

- noodle cut in half lengthwise and divided into 1-foot sections, or pounding bench and toy hammers
- · toddler tunnel
- push and pull toys (e.g., wagons, push walkers, carts)
- common classroom objects to use as obstacles (e.g., chairs, boxes, bins)

- colored masking tape
- ribbon and yarn (no longer than 8 inches)
- · photograph of each child's face
- · construction paper flowers
- hook-and-loop fastener tape
- · cardboard tubes or wooden craft sticks

- small open cups that children can hold independently

- water play props and accessories (e.g., ladles, spoons, whisks, bowls)

- riding toys (e.g., low scoot toys, wagons, rockers with handles, tricycles)

#### **Mathematics**

- plastic or wooden two- and threedimensional shapes; corresponding felt or cardstock cutouts to match the face or side of each shape
- sensory table or bin
- · sand
- collection of small objects (e.g., large shells, plastic animals, interesting rocks, feathers, pinecones, toy vehicles)
- materials for sand play (e.g., sifters, sieves, rakes, slotted spoons, and strainers)
- · plastic floor covering
- photos of children engaged in a variety of routines, such as eating, sleeping, and starting the day
- 9 x 13-inch cake pan
- · mixing bowl
- · electric kettle or sauce pan and stove
- · refrigerator
- a variety of biscuit or cookie cutters in basic geometric shapes
- shapes cut out of paper, felt, or card stock
- · plates
- · plush shape toys
- ingredients for cookie-cutter fun (1 12oz can of frozen juice concentrate, e.g., orange, grape, apple; 3 envelopes of unflavored gelatin; 1½ cups, which is 1 juice can; water for boiling; vegetable oil to grease pan; food coloring—optional)
- large, clear containers of water
- · trays or plates
- variety of objects that might sink or float (e.g., balls, cars, blocks, manipulatives, large feathers)
- large lightweight blocks
- cardboard boxes
- natural blocks
- · camera
- pots and pans
- · wooden spoons
- spatulas
- appliance box large enough for children to move through and around, with windows of different shapes cut out of it
- everyday objects that you use during daily activities (e.g., blocks, toy cars and trains, shoes, books, balls)

- clear, empty plastic jars with screw tops, such as peanut butter or mayonnaise jars
- large marbles (optional, kept out of the children's reach)
- ingredients for butter (heavy whipping cream—6 c. makes approximately 1 pound of butter, crackers or toasted bread slices, ½ t. salt per pound of butter—optional)
- · lively music recordings
- dirt or nontoxic potting soil
- · child-size gardening tools
- · watering cans
- variety of hardy, nontoxic houseplants or plastic or silk flowers
- · stuffed animals
- shoe boxes with lids
- interesting toys, fabric scraps, and other objects that can fit inside the boxes
- flat boards for making ramps
- objects to roll down ramps (e.g., blocks, cars, balls, crayons)
- stuffed animals and/or dolls of various lengths
- toy beds, boxes, or cardboard "beds" that correspond with the lengths of the dolls
- small blankets and other bedtime props
- nesting blocks and/or stacking cups
- laminated numeral cards from 1 to 5  $\,$
- five toy pigs
- collection of rocks of different sizes, colors, shapes, textures, and weights
- containers
- · large cardboard boxes
- hula hoops
- carpet squares
- ice cubes
- brushes of various sizes, from finepoint brushes to wide house-painting brushes
- · sponges
